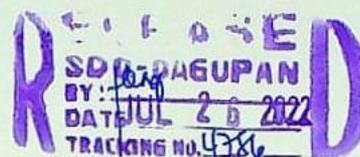

Subject : PREPARATION AND SUBMISSION OF SCHOOL BASIC EDUCATION
LEARNING RECOVERY PLAN

Date : July 26, 2022

1. As per stated in RM 664 s. 2022, all public and private elementary and secondary schools are enjoined to design their Basic Education Learning Recovery Plan (BELRP) in light of the COVID19 pandemic, that addresses learning recovery and extended learning opportunities to meet the needs of students that could include, but are not limited to, addressing academic, social and emotional gap filling, extending not only remediation but also enrichment/supplemental activities using differentiated approaches.
2. School BLRPs should address, but should not be limited to, the following key components:
 - Impacted Students: How will schools and districts identify which students have been most impacted by the pandemic in terms of their learning progress (with a focus on the most vulnerable student populations)?
 - Needs Assessment: How will schools and districts identify the needs of those students?
 - Resources and Budget: What resources are available to address those needs? Generally, what is the budget for the plan?



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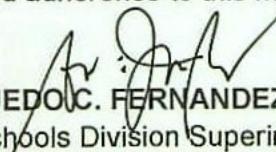
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- Approaches: What approaches can best be deployed to address those needs? (This may include approaches such as ending the school year later than scheduled, beginning the new year early, extending the school day, summer programs, tutoring, and remote options.)
 - Partnerships: Which local and regional partners (such as Educational Service Centers, Information Technology Centers, libraries, museums, after-school programs, or civic organizations) can schools engage in supporting student needs?
 - Alignment: How can this plan reinforce and align to other district or school plans? This may include but is not limited to Student Wellness and Success Fund plans, remote learning plans, improvement plans, CCIP-related plans, graduation plans.
3. Attached is a BE-LRP template to facilitate its completion.
 4. There will be an orientation on July 27, 2022 (Wednesday) @ 8:30 to 9:30 AM to be conducted via google meet. The link will be sent to the participants 30 minutes before the virtual meeting.
 5. Widest dissemination of and adherence to this memorandum is hereby enjoined.

Example:

Juan P. Guadiz ES has an enrolment of 201 for SY 2021-2022. Modular Distance Learning was used as learning delivery modality during the first two quarters. On the third quarter, expanded progressive limited face-to-face was reintroduced but only on a voluntary basis.

There were 150 learners who participated in the limited face-to-face and out these 120 passed their current grade level, 29 failed, and 1 got disengaged. And of the 51 who remained in the modular distance learning, there were 28 who passed, 10 who failed, and 12 who got disengaged.

How will schools identify who among the learners have been most impacted by the pandemic in terms of their learning progress (with a focus on the most vulnerable student populations including but not limited to disengaged students)?
